NIGERIA'S ISLAMIST INSURGENCY

Oxford University Press Northern and central Nigeria are engulfed in a violent insurgency campaign waged by Jama'atu Ahlis Sunnah Lidda'awati w'al Jihad, a.k.a. 'Boko Haram', and more recently, its splinter group 'Ansaru'. From its inception an inward-looking, almost parochial, movement, Boko Haram, and even more so Ansaru, have now showed clear signs of regionalization, expanding their operations across West Africa and forging links with al-Qaeda affiliated groups. And, more importantly, are the root causes of the insurgency being addressed and the foundations for a durable peace being established?

Farr looks not only at the victims themselves, but also at the sex trade's main players, organized crime structure, economic conditions, and role in which various militaries perpetuate its demand. *Sex Trafficking* can be incorporated into a variety of courses in sociology, social problems, culture and sexuality, history, and women's studies.
